'Stars! Eclipses and Explosions'

The Open University, Berrill Lecture Theatre, Milton Keynes, MK7 6AA

This is an opportunity to find out more about stars and their effects on the surrounding neighbourhood as studied by amateurs and professionals, on the basis of both practical observation and cosmological theory.

The cost for the day will be £15.00 for BAA members and £17.50 for non-BAA members. Accompanied Children under 16 £5.00. This cost includes a buffet lunch and tea/coffee during registration and in the afternoon.

Getting to this BAA Event

The Open University Campus is located in Milton Keynes. The Berrill Lecture Theatre is the first large building you see on the right as you enter the campus.

Car

Postcode MK7 6AA should be used for sat-navs. Both the A5 and the M1 are ideal routes to get to the site.

Milton Keynes has a grid system and all roundabouts (of which there are hundreds!) have the road coordinates marked. Head for the roundabout H9/V10, travel north for 200 metres and turn left into the campus.

Train

Milton Keynes Central Station is 5 km from the campus and a taxi will be needed to get to the OU. Bow Brickhill station (from Bedford) is 2.5km south of the campus

Parking

There is ample free car parking all around the Berrill Theatre.

Astronomy is part of the Department of Physical Sciences, and its research covers the environment in the Galaxy and star forming regions, and the subsequent populations of stars; exoplanetary astrophysics; observational cosmology; laboratory studies in astrochemistry. They have leading roles in many major international projects and facilities, including SuperWASP, JCMT Legacy Surveys, LOFAR, and Herschel. They use many international facilities, from ground-based observatories (e.g. ALMA, South African Large Telescope, ESO) to space telescopes (e.g. AKARI, Herschel, HST, Spitzer, STEREO), and are involved in the planning and preparation for future international missions (e.g. SPICA, FIRI, PLATO, EChO, Athena, Euclid).

The department also teaches more astronomy undergraduates than the rest of the UK higher education sector put together, with over 40 years' experience specialising in distance education, taking students from no previous knowledge to undergraduate degrees and beyond.
